Chocolate Toxicity

While you're indulging over Easter don't forget that the chocolate that we so love is toxic for our dogs. Be careful where you leave your eggs and bunnies, and make sure they're out of your dog's reach.

But what do you do if your dog does manage to sneak a few eggs?

The effect of consumption of chocolate will vary depending upon the type and amount of chocolate your dog ate as well as your dog's body weight.

Dark chocolate is the most harmful, and the more they eat, the greater the emergency. Before you panic, you can get a guide as to the urgency and seriousness by checking a chocolate toxicity calculator like the one at

Chocolate toxicity is serious and it can result in serious illness or death. If your dog has overdone it or if you have any concern whatsoever, go straight to the vet.
